I would like to publicly thank our presenters for providing relevant data to the conference attendees.

As some of you may have heard, the State of Illinois has a few challenges it must face this year. For a few of those we will have to wait to see how they play out. However, there are some challenges where Illinois educators can generate positive impact by cultivating involvement from our state leaders. Some of those challenges deal with completion rates at all levels of education (Associates, Bachelors and Masters Degrees), disparity of

graduation rates based on state geography and diversity in the classroom. Other areas of concern include reduced financial resources, increased enrollments and a business community demanding a more highly skilled workforce.

The Illinois Public Agenda for College and Career Success provides some very concerning data about the current state of our educational system and the students in it. The Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) created a task force to study the challenges and opportunities facing postsecondary education in Illinois, the state's workforce needs, demographic trends, higher education funding and student financial aid. At the close of this year's annual conference, University of Illinois Asst. VPAA, Dr. Charles Evans, made a call to action to address the increasing need to provide continuing and higher education to the residents and workforce of Illinois. The ICCHE Board is responding to that call

# 2009 Keynote—Continuing Education Marketing

YouTube videos, Second Life, Social Networking, Twitter, iTunesU, Ning! – as the world suffers the pangs, conflict and confusion of transforming from a service economy to an information economy, as Gen Y members begin working and looking for training opportunities, CE

marketing needs to change to reflect these new realities.

Kassia Dellabough of Learning Resources Network (LERN) presented this message during her keynote address at the 2009 IC-CHE Annual Conference in February, speaking about programming trends within continuing education and how those trends should be shaping marketing efforts.

Many institutions are now in conflict over

generational change, telecommuting, online vs. face to face, etc. Ms. Dellabough quipped that "I don't need a secretary, I need a technotary" to handle the social networking demands that have increasingly become a part of our lives.

eMarketing is now a defined job that includes social networking, advertising, text messaging, and integration of technology. And the audience for these marketing efforts needs to be internal as well as external to the organization. Internal PR is vital to ensure administrators see continuing education as "critical and essential, not just to society, but to the survival of the institution."

A practical suggestion for CE departments was to separate Programming functions from Operations, so that the former could focus on that important function and not be weighed down with administrative duties.

# Spotlight—Rick Pearce

In this issue we continue a pattern of using the Spotlight interview to say thank you and good-bye to an ex-officio ICCHE Board member. On March 11, Rick Pearce began a new job as the Vice President for Instruction and Student Development at Illinois Valley Community College (IVCC). His

departure from the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) ends his formal role within ICCHE but not his legacy of good-humored support of the organization. Not only has he provided a strong communication link with IBHE, at one recent annual meeting he gamely filled in on several different panels for speakers unavoidably detained.

For Rick, this new position will be a homecoming both personally and educationally. He is an alumnus of IVCC and was born and raised in Streator, where most of his immediate family still live. At the same time, the post represents a new beginning for both Rick and IVCC.

"I'm very excited about this opportunity. Although we tend to focus on the difficult financial times for higher education. these are actually very exciting times ripe with opportunities to grow in new ways. Under the leadership of President Jerry Corcoran, IVCC has decided to restructure its senior leadership model. In the past, the president had a cabinet that included a VP for Finance, a VP for Academic Affairs, and a VP for Student Services. As the college moves forward, the VPs for Academic Affairs and Student Services are being combined [into my new job] and a new VP for Planning and Assessment is being added."

Rick's educational path took him from IVCC to Illinois State University, where he earned an undergraduate degree in history and social sciences, a master's degree in history, and a doctorate in educational administration and foundations. After time teaching and working for American and Chinese universities in China, he taught East Asian history for ISU and

served as assistant chairman for the history department. He joined IBHE in 2005 and served in various roles within the academic affairs office.

When asked whether he found anything he'd learned about East Asian history to be particularly useful or relevant to his administrative and policy work in higher education, Rick replied, "I'm not sure about East Asian history, but I would say I've drawn one lasting lesson from East Asian culture. Asians do not like to be pushed. Nor do they like to be pulled. If you want to influence their direction, you must lead by example and demonstrate the value they will gain from following. I've tried to translate this idea to the work I've done in higher education. If you want someone to be committed to a project or idea, it doesn't work to force it from the top down or to require it through policy or rule. Instead, you must demonstrate the value and then allow people to take ownership of the idea and to run with it."

At ICCHE's annual meeting in February, he encouraged the group to take ownership of IBHE's Public Agenda for Illinois Higher Education. As Rick sees it, "The Public Agenda process brought together some of the best minds in education. business, community development, and government to craft a vision for advancing higher education in Illinois. But the Public Agenda will remain only a vision without input from the professionals in the field. They are the ones that can bring forward direct tactics to implement the Public Agenda strategies and help Illinois to reach its goals." Is there a role for ICCHE in that process? "I encourage each of you to go to the IBHE website and look at the implementation matrix. The Board needs you to identify programs, projects, strategies, measurable outcomes, etc. that make the vision a reality."

Although members may not see him as frequently at ICCHE events in the future, both two-year and four-year institutional members are likely to encounter Rick Pearce hard at work promoting educational opportunities in Central Illinois. As he put it, "I'm a strong

### 2009 Innovative Initiative Award Winner!

Illinois State University, in partnership with Heartland Community College, State Farm Insurance, local school districts, Regional Office of Education #17 and the public library, is the recipient of the ICCHE 2008 Innovative Initiative Award for their program entitled "Students Involved with Technology (SIT) Conference."

The SIT Conference is a day-long conference held on the campus of Heartland Community College in Normal, IL. Unlike other conferences, the majority of the presentations are by the students themselves. This unique innovation, in combination with a higher education framework, secured the award for this program.

**Debra Wylie** from Illinois State University, and **Kim Travers** from Heartland Community College accepted the award on behalf of their schools and shared their program with attendees.

"Students can choose to attend a full day of learning sessions on a wide range of technology subjects including robotics, gaming, Internet safety, web design, movie making, blogging, forensics, animation and much more. If a student also chooses to be a presenter on a technology topic of their choosing, they must create a

20-minute session, prepare handouts, and field questions and answers following their presentation/demonstration. The SIT Conference seeks to provide a realistic and professional level conference experience for student attendees and presenters."

"Students at all levels experience an environment of learning by doing, and by example. The SIT Conference seeks to provide a realistic and professional level conference experience for student attendees and presenters. The conference day includes opening and closing ceremonies, keynote speakers, multiple sessions by peers and by technology educators, experts and mentors."

"Typically, registrations for the conference reflect attendees from the local school districts in Central Illinois. Additionally, the conference has also reached out to home school associations to provide students in similar grade ranges with opportunities to participate."

"This partnership between higher education institutions gives students opportunities that normally would not exist in a typical classroom environment where all students are the same age. The conference was also replicated in DeKalb, IL this February."

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#### WHAT'S HAPPENING—AROUND THE STATE

#### University of Illinois—Chicago

Times are tough for those of us in higher education, including our students – can blended learning help create cost efficiencies that benefit all while improving learning effectiveness? Several institutions have been successful in the strategic use of blended learning and will share their strategies at the <u>Sixth Annual Sloan-C Workshop on Blended Learning and Higher Education</u>.

Hosted by the University of Illinois at Chicago, this two-day workshop will take place at the Wyndham Lisle-Chicago Hotel & Meeting Center in Lisle, Illinois on April 27 and 28, 2009. The \$495 registration fee includes all workshop materials and most meals. #### City Colleges of Chicago

The City Colleges of Chicago plan to add a <u>foreign-language requirement</u>, following a growing trend among community colleges across the country.

Starting this fall, the schools intend to require two semesters of foreign language to earn an associate of arts degree. The change would apply to students who plan to transfer to a four-year school, not those seeking vocational or technical degrees.

While two semesters might not make students fluent, it would establish a foundation for communication and give students experience with other cultures.

The requirement is pending approval by the Board of Trustees, which is expected to discuss it the first week in April, said Chancellor Wayne Watson.

William C. Hine, Dean School of Continuing Education at Eastern Illinois University made a presentation entitled "Third Age Learners: A New Challenge for Higher Education" at the Ohio Continuing Higher Education Association Conference March 12, 2009 in Newark, Ohio.

#### Oakton Community College

Oakton will be hosting a "Non-Traditional College Fair" on Wednesday, April 15, 4:30—6:30 PM at the Skokie, IL campus to explore creative and innovative ways to complete a bachelor's degree in record time. More than 35 Illinois colleges and universities will participate.

Oakton launched a new <u>Horticultural Therapy Certificate program</u> this spring, in cooperation with the Chicago Botanic Garden. Classes combine online learning and on-site instruction at the Botanic Garden in Glencoe, IL.

#### St. Xavier University

About 450 people participated in free health screenings, assessments and information at Saint Xavier University's 6th Annual Health Fair on Friday, March 27, in the Shannon Center at SXU's Chicago campus. The fair was free and open to the public. With about 40 vendors participating in the fair, the attendees enjoyed free health screenings and information, massages, cooking demonstrations, nutrition seminars, refreshments and much more. Heartland Blood Center assisted those who wanted to donate blood. Several people also won raffle prizes including gift certificates, gym memberships, healthy cookbooks, and gift baskets, which were provided by the vendors. 🌣

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# A Public Agenda for College and Career Success

The **Public Agenda for College and Career Success** is the product of a yearlong planning process initiated by the Illinois General Assembly and conducted by the Public Agenda Task Force and the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE).

Carrie Hightman, chairwoman, stated in her cover to the report that it "is a portrait of two states of Illinois. One Illinois is well educated and prosperous, with virtually unlimited opportunities. The other is vastly underserved educationally and struggling economically, with severely constricted opportunities."

"Between these two states of Illinois is a 'prosperity gap' that relates directly to large and widening disparities in educational attainment – by race/ethnicity, by income, and by region. Closing the attainment gap is no longer only just a moral imperative; it can be ignored only at the economic peril of Illinois. It requires *action* and requires action *now*."
