On April 13, ICCHE's Downstate Region will hold its annual meeting at Heartland Community College, Workforce Development Center, in Normal, IL, from 9:30 AM to 3:15 PM. Kelli Hill, Executive Director—Central Illinois Regional Collaborative Effort (CIRCLE) at Heartland Community College will offer a keynote address. Her presentation will target the Art and Science of Collaboration—Increasing collaborative opportunities around shared priorities to achieve social and economic goals.

Following lunch, a panel discussion will focus on Collaboration in Action. Panelists will include Dr. Rick Pearce, Vice President for Learning, Illinois Valley Community College; Elaine Sebald, Edible Economy Steering Committee Chair and Heartland Local Food Network, Inc.; and Dr. Amy Bloom, Assistant Director for Outreach, CdMaST at Illinois State University.

Concluding the day will be a Tour and "Mini-Mission" of the Challenger Learning Center. The Learning Center has developed an intense team-building program geared to helping organizations improve communication, teamwork and problem-solving through a simulated space mission. The Simulation takes participants out of the workplace environment and into an engaging interactive experience, where team members have the opportunity to switch roles, and demonstrate skill improvement methods. In addition, the Challenger Learning Center provides a rich educational experience where students can explore "all things outer space," including rockets, our Solar System, the Galaxy and beyond.

New Jobs for Illinois College Grads

"College Changes Everything" is the slogan for the Illinois Student Assistance Commission Corps., which aims to impact such challenging issues as life expectancy, poverty, obesity, voting and income. By employing recent college grads as powerful role models and mentors, the State hopes to encourage college attendance for high-risk students —a win-win for all involved.

"The <u>Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC</u>) currently has several job openings throughout the state for ISAC Corps members. The full-time job is for college graduates to work as "near peers" with students and their parents, who are involved in planning to attend colleges, especially students who will be the first in their family to go to college and/or are from low-income households. The program is a product of the College Access Challenge Grant awarded to Illinois by the U.S. Department of Education. Corps members are placed geographically in community college districts statewide.

This program provides a tremendous opportunity for recent college graduates to gain work experience in a variety of higher education fields and help make a difference in the lives of students and families. As a result of their work, Corps members have presented at state and national conferences, transitioned to graduate school, or used it as a stepping stone for future employment. Many former Corps members can be found working in high schools and colleges throughout Illinois.

The Vernon O. Crawley Scholarship is exclusive to students

- 1. attending Moraine Valley Community College full-time;
- 2. taking 12 or more credit hours per semester; having earned a minimum of a 3.5 GPA.

The candidate nominated must be in the last semester of his/her program and have received his/her associate degree prior to starting at SXU in the fall 2012. Transfer students from Moraine Valley Community College must officially apply at Saint Xavier University. Students may apply for admission for free online.

Familiar to many ICCHE members from his 2009 presentation at Starved Rock, Adam Shames, M.A., facilitated *"Educating for Innovation: Creativity Competencies for the 21st Century."* Adam led a morning of energizing, creativity-generating, full engagement, active live learning, including brainstorming, songwriting, instrument playing, and creative problem solving. Adam's takeaways:

A recent IBM global CEO study found creativity to be the number one leadership quality.

Innovation is all about improving what's now and creating what's next.

You do that by giving yourself more permission to come up with, share, and try out new ideas and programs. Some reminders:

"Yes, and": Spend time building on each other's ideas instead of focusing on what's wrong with them.

"P.T.S./P.T.F.".: Allow time for giving yourself permission to suck; take on small pilot projects with permission to fail.

"F, F, O": Encourage fluency ("divergence time") in meetings, flexibility (seek other perspectives) and originality (follow passion and empower others to follow theirs) as creativity competencies both individually and as an institution.
